- Accessibility improvements in recreational facilities such as Poirier Sport and Leisure Complex (PSLC) and City Centre Aquatic Complex (CCAC)
- The City’s new AccessAbility Resource Guide
- Initiatives and supports for newcomers
- The City’s Seniors Week being held from June 4 to 10, 2023
- The City’s Meaningful Meals for Seniors Program (MMSP)
- The City’s financial supports for older residents such as the Financial Assistance for Recreation (FAR) Program and free tax clinics at Dogwood Pavilion and Glen Pine Pavilion

Discussion ensued relative to the following:

- Referrals process and access to referral forms for the MMSP
- The MMSP’s costs and meal options
- The desire to see physical disabilities, particularly involving sports and recreation, included in EDI initiatives
- The extent of the City’s partnerships with Canucks Autism Network (CAN) and Special Olympics British Columbia (SOBC)
- Opportunities to highlight programs
- Support for the Pride flag being flown at City Hall
- Timeframe for developing an accessibility plan and the possibility of public consultation
- Provincial legislation regarding the development and implementation of an accessibility plan

- Rick Hansen Foundation grants and whether the Foundation certifies facilities in terms of accessibility
- Accessibility renovations and support programs at Dogwood Pavilion
- The possibility of a more structured brochure for seniors programs at Dogwood Pavilion
- Accessibility options and considerations regarding the online Ipsos Community Satisfaction Survey
- The City's contact person for accessibility issues and concerns
- The possibility of the Committee having its own email address to receive feedback from residents with accessibility concerns

### 3. **2024 – 2027 Strategic Renewal: Opportunity for Input**

The Director Corporate Planning and the Project Manager – Corporate Planning provided the Committee with an on-screen presentation entitled “2024 – 2027 Strategic Plan Renewal” that covered the following topics:

- Overview of the City's Strategic Plan (hereon “the Plan”)
- Key objectives, timeline and engagement opportunities for the Plan's renewal process
- Synergy between the Plan and other City corporate plans
- The Plan's core components and components that will be updated in 2024 and 2028
- Key themes identified by the annual Business Plan and online Ipsos Community Satisfaction Survey
- How the Committee's feedback will be reported to Council and used to develop actionable items

Discussion ensued relative to the following:

- In regards to the *Safe and Complete Neighbourhoods* theme, including accessible programs for youth, street lighting at night, variety of transportation options, ample sidewalk space, affordable housing, different housing choices beyond single family homes, engagement with isolated seniors, accessible amenities and services, gender-neutral bathrooms, specific protections for women such as buddy-systems for walking at night, and easily accessible mental health supports
- In regards to the *Local Economy and Local Jobs* theme, including entry level and well-paying jobs, accessible employment for people with disabilities, job opportunities for seniors, collaboration with post-secondary institutions, protection of employment spaces such as commercial and industrial lands, internship employment for youth, outreach programs, strategic use of volunteers, mentorship opportunities, employment incentives through EDI lens, mixed-use neighbourhoods, and smaller pockets of community services
- In regards to the *Healthy Community and Active Citizens* theme, including affordable groceries, promoting farmers' markets, accessible community gardens and grants for neighbourhood barbeques, diversity of park locations, physical accessibility in parks and sports fields, incorporating climate adaptation measures into community designs, vibrant arts and culture community, additional events for youth ages 15 to 30 and additional library space, and providing alternative transportation options
- In regards to the *Sustainable Services, Environment and Infrastructure* theme, including climate adaptation measures and options, stipulations in Zoning Bylaws related to the environment, accessibility requirements for housing and community amenities tied to development, and urban forest management

- In regards to the *Excellence in City Governance* theme, including listening to diverse community groups and individuals, providing an accessible contact person for information, consolidating accessible City program information, and adapting to change
- Whether the online Strategic Plan Survey is offered in other languages and how long it takes to complete

- The necessity of forming working groups for the 2023 Biennial Education Event and the 2023 Welcome to Coquitlam Event
- The extent of previous sub-committee work for the 2023 Biennial Education Event

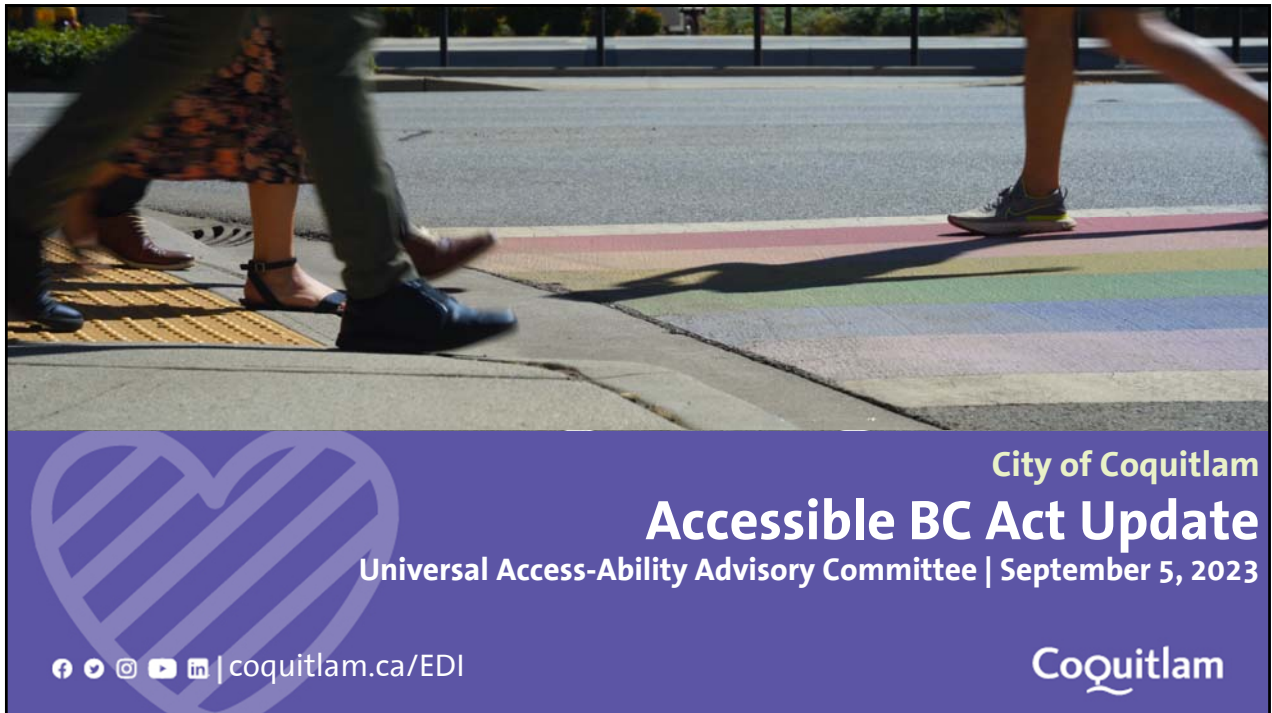

## Removing Barriers to Accessibility

21% of BC residents over age of 15 live with a disability

70% of people with disabilities report more than one disability

42% of BC residents over the age of 65 live with a disability

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## Background

- ABC Act presents requirements to:
  - Create an accessibility committee;
  - Create an accessibility plan;
  - Create a feedback mechanism on this plan.
- Municipalities are now prescribed organizations
- No singular approach
- Coquitlam is well positioned for 2023 and beyond



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## Actions for 2023



- Continue to use and engage with the Universal Access-Ability Advisory Committee as the designated accessibility committee
- Continue to promote City's accessibility programs and resources
- Manager EDI to coordinate key staff on this wide-ranging, cross-department work

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## Actions for 2023 (Continued)



- New accessibility webpage with feedback mechanism
  - [Coquitlam.ca/EnhancingAccessibility](https://coquitlam.ca/EnhancingAccessibility)
- Continue to highlight City work and actions across the organization that focus on enhancing accessibility
- Build awareness/education around spectrum of disability inclusion efforts

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## Positive Community Impacts

- Advancing EDI principles by initiating the City's first ever Accessibility Plan with a focus on:
  - Inclusion
  - Adaptability
  - Diversity
  - Collaboration
  - And more
- Continuing to prioritize accessibility in service of our diverse and growing community
- Opportunity to initiate/formalize key work such as inclusive hiring supports for persons with disabilities (visible and invisible)

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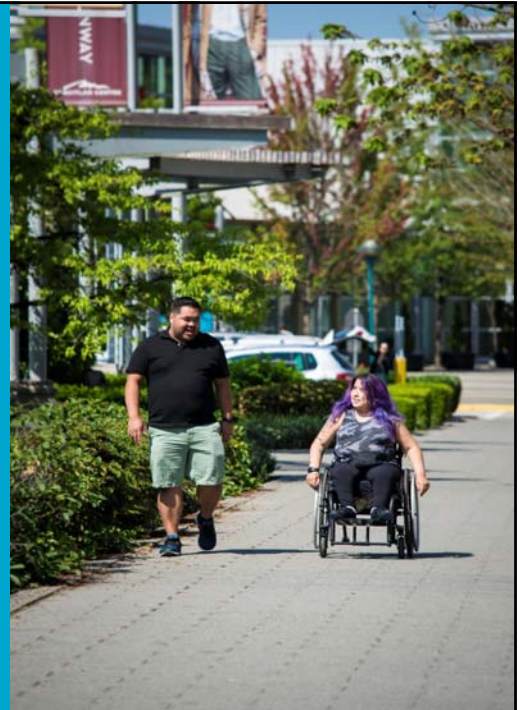

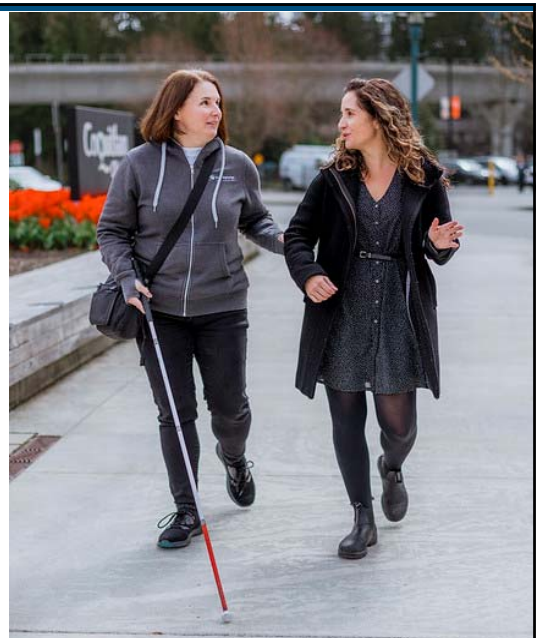

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## 1. Context

### Innovative Housing

- The City encourages cost-effective provision of accessible housing and adaptable housing that meets the needs of people with disabilities.
- City policies and regulations support housing affordability and inclusivity.
- The Housing Affordability Strategy encourages innovative unit types including accessible housing.

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## Housing Need

- Accessible housing provides an opportunity to respond to housing needs in Coquitlam:
  - A growing seniors population with distinct needs based on mobility issues / disabilities
  - A high demand for non-market, accessible housing
  - 921 households on BC Housing's Housing Registry waitlist - including 122 People with Disabilities and 31 households requiring a wheelchair-modified unit.

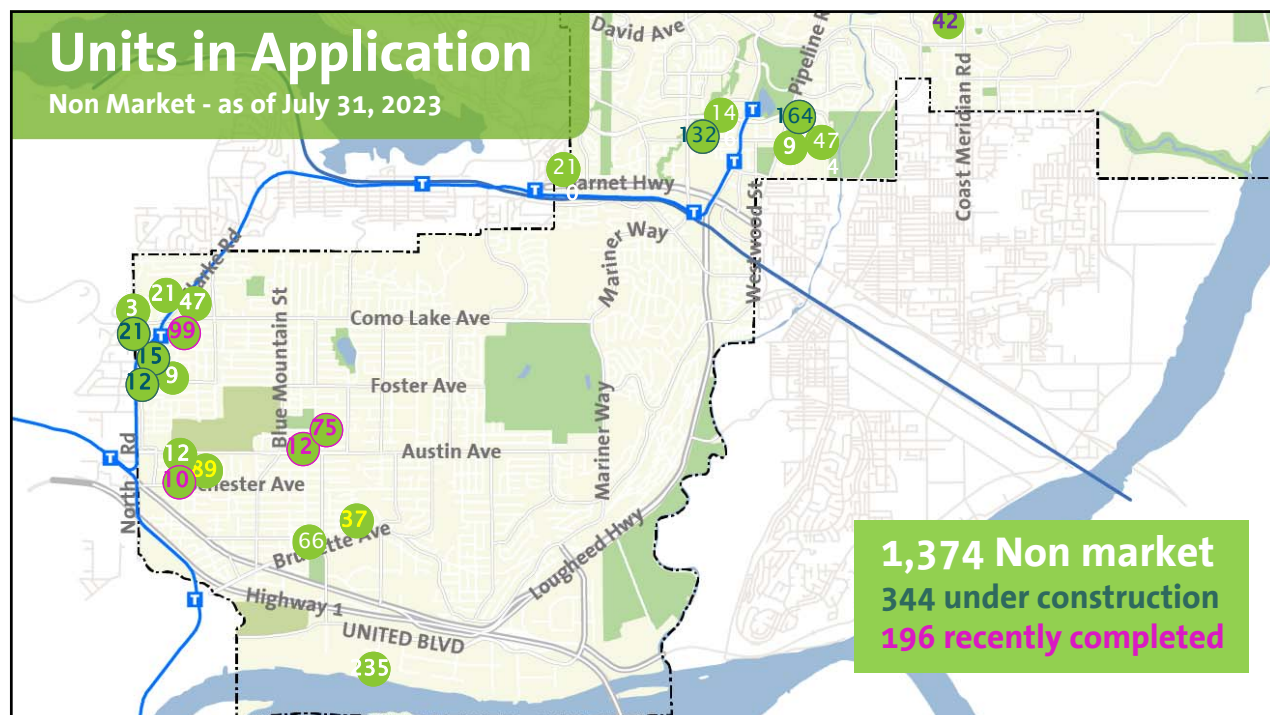

## 3. Requirements + Standards

## Requirements

- The City does not prescribe the amount of accessible housing required in new residential construction; instead providing incentives to build accessible units through:
  - Density transfers
  - Amenity and parking reductions
  - Additional density allowances
  - Density bonus contributions waivers
  - Floor area exclusions
- The City's incentives-based approach differs from many other municipalities which can be more prescriptive and focused on adaptable housing.

## 4. Universal Design

## Universal Design

- The design and composition of an environment so that it can be accessed, understood and used to the greatest extent possible by all people regardless of their age, size and ability; recognizing that people's needs can change over time.
- The overall goal is to ensure spaces do not discriminate, and they benefit people of all abilities, needs and cultural preferences.

## Universal vs. Accessible Design

Universal Design	Accessible Design
Holistic	Conformant
Proactive	Prescriptive
Inclusive	Incremental
Attractive	Utilitarian
Affordable	Minimal
Flexible	Visible

## Universal Design

- UD does not necessarily result in an element, space or complete building that meets building code accessibility requirements.
- UD complements, but does not replace, accessible design.
- CMHC's UD Guide is intended for new multi-unit residential buildings. It is not a replacement for building code requirements or CSA accessibility standards.







## Conclusion

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## Conclusion

- The City recognizes the need to provide innovative housing to support diverse housing needs through policies, regulations and programs (e.g. rental policy incentives, density bonus for accessible housing, the AHRF).
- Opportunities exist to review City policies, regulations and programs and explore ways to better support persons with disabilities.
- Looking ahead, changes coming from the Province (i.e. updates to the BC Building Code) will impact new construction through requirements to meet new accessibility standards.

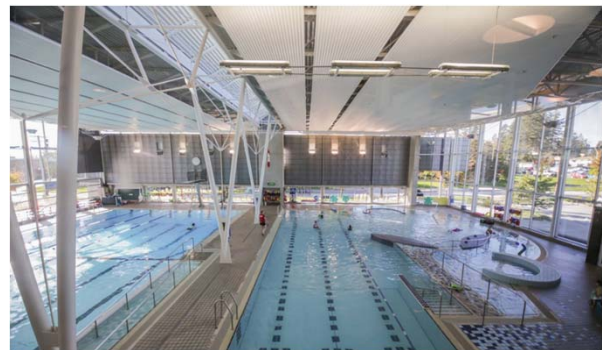

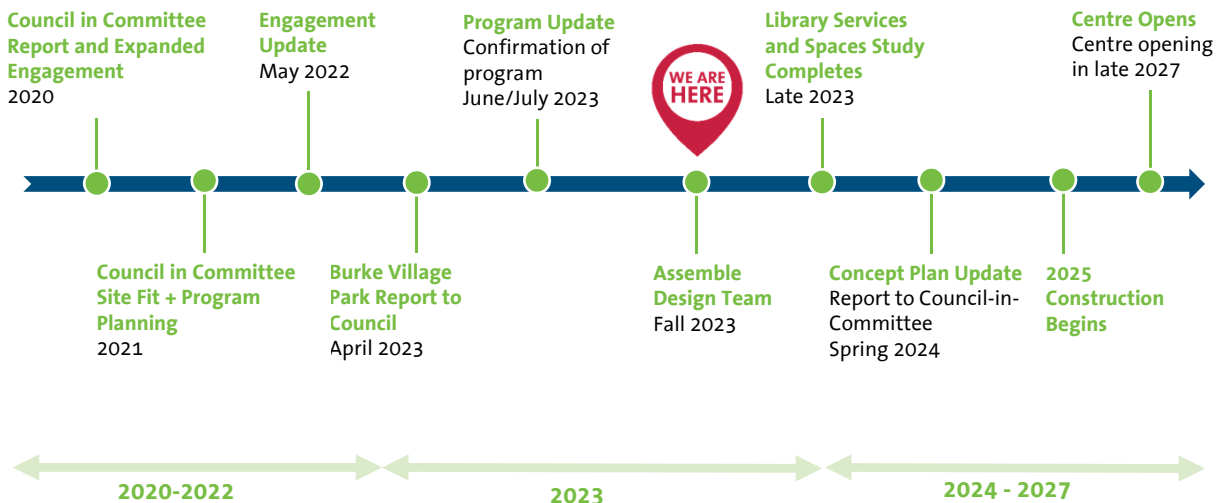

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## E-Mobility: E-Scooter Pilot

City selected Lime and Neuron for shared e-scooter & e-bike pilot

- RFP issued in March, awarded in May
- Operations launched June 29
- 35k trips (as of Aug 31)
- ~550 daily trips
- Shared Micromobility Stations where people can start/end trips and to reduce accessibility impacts



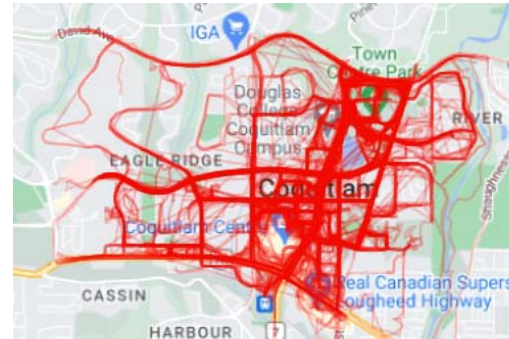

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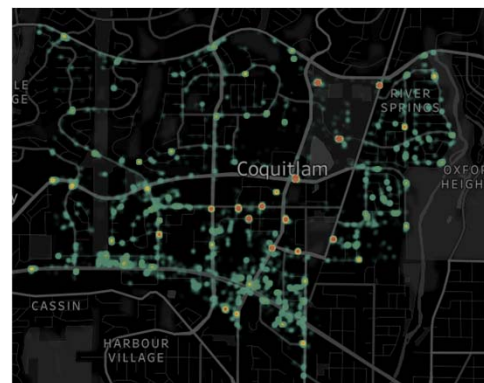
