Coquitlam's Bettie Allard YMCA Nears Completion

In a Sept. 26 update to Coquitlam City Council, representatives for the YMCA of Greater Vancouver and City staff shared that the Bettie Allard YMCA, as well as the other associated civic amenities, will receive occupancy this fall.

Opening events, tours, and YMCA membership purchases will take place through the fall as well. All facilities will be open to the public toward the end of 2022 with full operation beginning in January 2023.

This unique project, made possible through an innovative partnership, brings a range of services to the heart of the Burquitlam neighbourhood. This includes a 55,000 square foot YMCA (with an indoor pool), a 3,700 square foot Community Police Station, 222 stalls of underground parking, including dedicated park-and-ride spaces, 2.55 acres of new parkland, transportation improvements and residential rental and strata towers developed by Concert Properties with 100 non-market rental suites operated in partnership with 43 Housing Society. Economic Development Strategy Making Progress

Coquitlam's Economic Development Strategy (EDS) is starting to take shape with the completion of the community engagement and the data gathering process.

Two foundational documents – a draft Vision and an Employment Lands and Economy Review – were presented to Council-in-Committee on Monday afternoon. These two documents will shape the development of the draft EDS, which will provide a strategic vision and implementation plan for a local economy that works for everyone. They will also help the project team continue to draft the EDS, as well as an Implementation Plan and Strategic Investment Plan. The final EDS is anticipated to be finished early in 2023 for implementation beginning the same year.
