Pillow Station, 2016

Location: Lincoln Station (1140 Pinetree Way)

Artists: Paul Slipper and Mary Ann Liu

A moment of calm and playfulness during the bustle of commuting. The designs of each pillow celebrates Coquitlam's multicultural community.

Migration, 2013

Location: Coquitlam Public Library, City Centre Branch (1169 Pinetree Way). Located inside the library and accessible during library hours. **Artist:** Blake Williams

A reflection of the thoughts and perceptions of Coquitlam residents, who have immigrated from another country and settled in Coquitlam.

Paperback Dream, 2024

Location: Coquitlam Public Library, City Centre Branch (1169 Pinetree Way). Located on the north wall outside of the library. **Artist:** Carolyn Wong/Seeroro

The free-spirited essence of imagination captured through the depiction of a girl surrounded by Coquitlam's natural beauty.

The Ripple, 2023

Location: 1198 Pinetree Way

Artists: Raven-Tacuara Collective

A Coast Salish spindle whorl face at its centre, ringed by protective "ripples" of the area's plants and animals. The art symbolizes Indigenous presence and guardianship on this land.

Return of the Sockeye, 2010

Location: Spirit Square (3003 Burlington Drive)

Artists: Ross Ireland and SD Inc, Chris Phillips, Phillips Farevaag Smallerberg

A large red sockeye salmon arching its body over a concrete wall that represents a man-made dam. It tells the story of the small red salmon abundant in the Coquitlam River until the 20th century.

Our Salmon, Our Children, One Earth (Children of the Earth), 2000

Location: City Hall, Main Floor (3000 Guildford Way). Located inside City Hall and accessible during City Hall hours. **Artists:** Marina Papais, Richard Thompson, Daun Yorke, Norman Tait (Nisga'a Nation), Lucinda Turner, Robert Barratt and Daniel Collett

Created in collaboration with students from School District #43. The artists provided Coquitlam students with a comprehensive view of salmon and the importance of their preservation.

TransLake, 2016

Location: Lafarge Lake-Douglas Station (1201 Pinetree Way) **Artist:** Trent Hutton

Similar to how a tadpole transforms into a frog, this piece reflects the history of how a quarry was transformed into Lafarge Lake in 1989.

Ancestral Legacy, 2024

Location: Town Centre Park Community Centre (1207 Pinetree Way) **Artists:** Raven-Tacuara Collective and members of the kwikwāxam First Nation

Animals native to Coquitlam, including birds, a bear, and a salmon, which represent the air, land, and water around us.

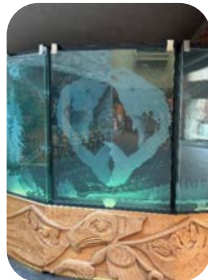
