



Community Wildfire Resiliency in Coquitlam

Coquitlam updated its Community Wildfire Resiliency Plan in 2021 with FireSmart™ principles adopted in British Columbia and across Canada.

The implementation of the plan's 43 recommendations strengthens Coquitlam's wildfire resiliency.

Major Initiatives and Achievements

Completed Work

2021

Wildfire Exercise – Eagle Mountain

• Coquitlam Fire/Rescue hosted a large-scale wildfire exercise including multiple jurisdictions and agencies.

This exercise addressed recommendations 32, 34, and 35.

FireSmart Campaign

Coquitlam partnered with Port Coquitlam, Anmore, and Belcarra receiving a Community Resiliency Investment grant of \$187,375. One significant outreach event included:

- Door-to-door outreach public education campaign with FireSmart materials reaching 7,615 homes
- 249 property assessments completed using the Ignition Assessment Score Card
- 31 properties received risk mitigation support

These efforts addressed recommendation 3.

2023 - 2024

A \$120,000 grant supported:

- A wood-chipping program for Wildland Urban Interface properties
- Three educational events and training for firefighters and prevention staff
- Engagement in Hazard Risk and Vulnerability Assessment planning
- Completion of fuel prescriptions for high-risk Wildland Urban Interface areas
- Targeted fuel treatment to reduce wildfire risk


Fuel prescription work addressed recommendation 41

Upcoming Work

2025 - 2026

A \$200,000 grant application has been submitted and if approved, will support:

- Fuel treatment work continues in high-risk Wildland Urban Interface areas
- Fire Prevention Education Open House at Burke Mountain Fire Hall
- Community education event planning underway for Westwood Plateau in 2026
- Ongoing staff training, critical infrastructure assessments and multi-agency collaboration



Wildfire Preparedness Efforts

15 recommendations are addressed every year

Recommendation Number	Initiative
2	Two FireSmart workshops or presentations

35	Ongoing multi-agency wildfire training with British Columbia Wildfire Service
36	Work with Office of the Fire Commissioner for guidance on interface training programs



Additional Wildfire Preparedness Efforts

Each summer the City runs a coordinated wildfire awareness campaign featuring enforcement updates and public safety tips.

Bylaw Enforcement Highlights

- Smoking fines in parks increase to \$500 June 1 to September 30
- Cigarette littering \$150 fine
- Increased patrols by vehicle, foot and e-bikes
- Open fires prohibited in all parks or anywhere in Coquitlam \$150 fine
- Public encouraged to report violations
